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Climate change is human made

Speakers at AiA symposium stress on the need for civil society engagement



Climate change can be delayed if technological, social and political class works together to achieve a synergy with some adaptive mechanisms, says Prof. N.H. Ravindranath. Professor at Centre for Sustainable Technologies, Indian Institute of Science, Bengaluru, Ravindranath was the chief guest at the first session of the symposium titled "Rethinking Globalisation: Climate Change, Environment and Public Health, organized by Awareness in Action at Gandhi Bhavana, Bengaluru on February 24, 2019. It was third in the series of symposia on 'rethinking globalisation'. The first session deliberated upon the nature of crisis that has emerged due to climate change and the state of policy measures. Ravindranath said that the government's initiatives are very limited to address these concerns and called upon the civil society to be conscious in responding to the crisis. Speaking at the inaugural session, K. A. Badrinath, Editor of Financial Chronicle, said there was no doubt about

the degradation of environment and also its impact on the life of people. He emphasised that there was a need for national commitment to take critical steps without succumbing to global political pressures. Speaking at the Second session, Dr K. A. Subramanian, Scientist, ICMR, Chennai gave an overview of the environment and biodiversity, the issues of biodiversity hotspots and the conservation issues around them. He stressed on the need for conscious consumption. Mallikarjunlytha, President of the fair-trade forum, said fair trade is the only way to develop the idea of conscious consumption and the civil society initiatives on consumption are the need of the hour. The third session dealt with Epidemiology, Tropical Medicine and Public Health. Dr. Raman R. Gangakhedkar, Senior Scientist, ZSI gave an overview of the communicable diseases, their outbreaks and the available framework to deal with the crisis of public health including the epidemics around bioterrorism. He contended that these initiatives are meaningful when the civil society

is sensitised.

Dr C. G. Raut, Scientist, MCI, Bengalurr and memb er NIMHANS, Goa, coordinated the session. Dr B. N. Gangadhar, Director, NIIT, Jabalpur made a prese ntation around the outbreak of 40 plus Viruses in Indi a in the past three decades. Dr. Prashant, Associate Professor, NIRTH – ICMR gave the valedictory address, while M.S. Chaitra, Director of Aarohi Research Foundation spoke about the future symposia of AiA. While Sanjeev Kumar Ningombam introduced the theme of the symposium, Prof. Dinesh Kumar, Senior Scientist, National Institute of Nutrition introduced the objective of the Conference and AiA secretary M. Madhavi spoke about the activities of the organization.

However, there are lot of i nadequacies, Mohanty said and called upon the o rganization to flag the commonly observed issues a nd find solutions for them through discussions, s eminars, invitation of papers and research. S peaking at the valedictory, senior CESS officer Dr. B. Janardhana Reddy said there are billions of ideas on any subject. Mere ideation without execution leads to delusion. Elaborating more, he said there were 2000 slums in Hyderabad and there are very good ideas to upgrade the slums. However, only 39 are upgraded so far.

This shows that there is no dearth of ideas, but what is lacking is execution of ideas. He appealed to the AiA to transform ideas into reality. The two-day event was a success with many young participants presenting ideas and research papers on the topics Urban Infrastructure and Pollution, Environment & Biodiversity, Green and Clean Hyderabad.

Symposium on Emerging Technologies: Curriculum, Industry and Policy at Hyderabad

In order to communicate the real policy gaps and ground level initiatives required to the stakeholders and policymakers concerned, AiA will organise a symposium titled "Emerging Technologies: Curriculum, Industry and Policy" at JNTUH, on August 2nd, 2019, Friday. Our further focus is to support/encourage research and development along with connecting students and industrialists, as we believe that their combination would boost the research sector and in turn would facilitate Nation's Development.

Symposium on Rethinking Globalisation: Contextualising Globalization of University Education at Bengaluru

At Bengaluru Globalization, being a multidimensional process, has affected almost every sphere of our life including education in general and the University education in particular.
